The pea gravel has been topped up in the playground to reduce mud and increase safety. Thank you to all the volunteers who came out to give the final cleaning of the school and a special thank you to the 20 volunteers who came out one night to help the property committee replace 19 toilets throughout the older section of the school. Many hands made light work.

Information such as School Policies and Procedures, snow day information, school calendars and events, and a memory work tab for every grade are included. You can track the progress of the Building on Blessings campaign and also...crisp, clear and easy to read bus routes!

Our Principal, Mr. George Hofsink, could report to the Board that all systems are go for school to begin. Teaching positions have been filled with one addition. We may welcome Mrs. Inge De Visser who will fill in for Mrs Aasman while she is on her maternity leave. We are thankful to the Lord that He continues to provide capable teachers to teach His covenant children at John Calvin. We wish Mrs. DeVisser the Lord's blessing and we hope she will find teaching here amongst our staff and students a fulfilling experience.

"But the fruit of the Spirit is love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, goodness, faithfulness, gentleness, self-control; against such things there is no law...lf we live by the Spirit, let us also keep in step with the Spirit." (Galatians 5:22,23,25)

This well-known text was selected as our theme text for the 2015-2016 school year in conjunction with our study of the 7 intellectual virtues (courage, carefulness, tenacity, fair-mindedness, curiousity, honesty, humility) as described by Philip Dow in his book, Virtuous Minds: Intellectual Character Development. During the course of the school year, the staff will be paying attention to each of these virtues as well as to the 9 fruit of the Spirit (one virtue per month which will be followed by three clusters of three fruit for April, May, and June).

The fruit of the Spirit (moral, Christian character) is the spontaneous work of the Holy Spirit in us. The Spirit produces these character traits that are found in the nature of Christ. They are the by-products of Christ's control - we cannot obtain them by trying to get them without His help. If we want the fruit of the Spirit to grow in us, we must join our lives to His. We must know Him, love Him, remember Him, and imitate Him. As a result, we will fulfill the intended purpose of the law-to love God and our neighbours. A person who exhibits the fruit of the Spirit fulfills the law far better

than a person who observes the rituals but has little love in his or her heart. Each day we must pray to God our Father to work in us these fruit by His Spirit and His Word.

God is interested in every part of our lives, not just the spiritual part. As we live by the Holy Spirit's power, we need to submit every aspect of our lives to God-emotional, intellectual, physical, social, and vocational. Paul says that because we are saved, we should live like it. The Holy Spirit is the source of our new life, so we need to keep in step with His leading. We must not let anything or anyone else determine our values and standards in any area of our life.

Kindergarten classes will be operating in the same manner as they did last year: KA- Mondays, Thursdays and every other Wednesday; KB- Tuesdays, Fridays, and every other Wednesday. KB's first day of school will be Tuesday, September 8 and KA's first day of school will be Wednesday, September 9.

Curriculum

This is a key element of the teacher's work at school. This is the second part of why teachers teach; the first, of course, being the students. In teaching their curriculum, the teachers strive to incorporate the praiseworthy deeds of the Lord whenever they can and wherever relevant. They work hard in developing curriculum that is rooted in God's Word. It is developed and organized so that the students they teach may come to know God more deeply and richly and live for Him more faithfully.

Curriculum is always undergoing review and change and this year is no exception. Once again, the teachers will be involved with several projects:

- 1) Mathematics- This year, we are implementing the ACSI Purposeful Design Mathematics program in Grades K, 1, 7, and 8. We plan to implement Grades 2-4 (2nd edition) in the 2016-2017 school year, and Grades 5&6 (2nd edition) in the 2017-2018 school year.
- Growing Success- The teachers plan to apply various aspects of assessment and evaluation to improve their instructional practice and to improve their students' learning.
- 3) Social Studies- Our goal for the Social Studies, History, Geography curriculum is to review and revise our current units of study, as necessary, and to remain updated on the work being done by CARE on Social Studies.
- 4) Church History- The goal is to remain updated on

the work being done by CARE in this subject area.

5) Virtuous Minds (Intellectual Character Development)- Our goal in this book study is to become more informed about intellectual character development and determine how best to apply character development to the education of covenant children at John Calvin School.

Parent Handbook

Dress Code

Parents and students are reminded of the John Calvin School dress code as found on pp 11-13 in the policies section of the Parent Handbook. Students' clothing needs to reflect the basic Christian values of modesty, neatness, and cleanliness.

Buses

There are a few things that specifically need to be mentioned by way of reminder:

Gym Clothing

We refer you to the dress code policy in the Policies and Procedures section of the Parent Handbook. All students are expected to have the necessary items. If you are lacking some items, and for students new to the school, these items will be made available at the school. A notice with specifics will go home in the first week of school.

Please be reminded to purchase non-scuffing gym shoes and the need for good shock absorbency in shoes on a non-giving gym floor. All the floors throughout the school have been waxed over the summer and we would like to preserve the clean and shiny look as long as possible; soft, black rubber soles will scuff up the floors very quickly. Our custodian, Mr. Bos, will be especially grateful for your cooperation.

School Times

School hours will remain the same as in previous years:

8:10 School starts 9:55-10:15 Morning recess 11:45-12:40 Lunch break

2:55-3:00 Clean-up and dismissal

3:10 Buses leave

We encourage parents to note that school starts at 8:10 which is already quite early. We discourage students living within walking or biking distance from showing up at school any earlier than 7:55 a.m.. Staff members are quite busy during the time before the start of the school day, and playground supervision is not provided for at that time of day. Thanks again for your cooperation.

The school secretary, Mrs. N. Elgersma, will conduct office business in the school every morning from 8:00-12:00. Mr. Hofsink will be available in the mornings from before school to 8:25, from 9:10 to 10:15, and during each afternoon. Please keep this in mind when trying to contact the school.

Student Supplies and Order Forms

We can be brief under this topic and simply refer you to the Policies and Procedures section of the Parent Handbook. Once again, we would like to make mention of the need for a good pencil case/ box since some of the classrooms are going to be used for catechism classes and some rooms will be accommodating more than one grade. Such an item is great for storing writing and colouring tools and is also helpful for maintaining neat desks and floors.

Mission

The collections for this work have done really well for many years, and if we continue to be diligent at the fairly minimal amount of 25 cents per child per week (of course we are not limited to that amount), we can keep up that tradition. We encourage the students to give spontaneously and joyfully. Let us share generously from our abundance. This year, we

will be supporting the operation of Adoration Christian School in Haiti, Children of Light, and Hope Academy in Toronto. In the event of additional monies we will help support New Hope Orphanage in Timor.

Anaphylaxis and Allergies

John Calvin School is a nut free school. Please be reminded of the following precautions that need to be taken:

- All nut products are banned in the school. We have 1. several students in the school population identified with a severe nut allergy. Be especially wary of peanut butter.
- A student with a nut allergy is at greatest risk on 2. the bus. Children do not always observe the No Eating rule on the bus. Please impress upon your children that they do not consume food or drink on the bus. Guido students who use the bus should also be cautioned about this.
- Encourage your children to wash their hands and brush their teeth to remove any peanut butter residue before they go to school.
- If you wish to treat your child's class, i.e. birthdays, please make sure about any children in that class who may have a food-related allergy, e.g. peanuts, brazil nuts, milk products, etc.

We also have a number of children with asthma and/or related respiratory allergies. For the benefit of these children we ask all teachers not to wear perfumes, after shaves, or other scented products. We also urge parent volunteers who work in the school to refrain from using scented products when they are at school. Those suffering from allergies will appreciate it.

Volunteers

The help and enthusiastic assistance of volunteers is and remains much appreciated by the staff. A lot of time consuming tasks for the teachers can be taken over by volunteers, thus allowing them to focus on the tasks that only they can/should do. If you are wondering if your helping hands are still needed, the answer is YES. Just let the PTA know that you are available and interested and they will take it from there. The Kindergarten classes are especially in need of volunteers this year. Thanks in advance for your consideration.

Please join us for the annual Open House on Wednesday, September 2 from 7:00-8:30. You and your children will be able to visit the school and meet the staff. The Ladies' uxiliary has once again agreed to make a treat available to us. We hope to see you then.

Parents, grandparents, and members of the supporting community are invited to join us at the opening assembly on Tuesday morning, September 8 beginning at 8:30.

In conclusion, we pray for the Lord's blessing and guidance on the new school year, 2015-2016. Transportation Committee Report

The Transportation Committee has once again been busy getting the bus routes and buses ready for another school year. This year we will not be publishing the maps in the News and Views. Maps can be found online at johncalvin.ca. (If you are unable to access the website, please contact one of the Transportation Committee members.) The routes are quite similar to last year but please still review your routes and information. If we have made any errors please contact a member of our committee so that we can update our records and keep them accurate. It is important that we have the correct information in order to help things run smoothly in the event of a school cancellation. If school is going to be cancelled due to weather conditions, we will let the bus drivers know and they in turn will inform all the families on their afternoon routes.

When making the bus routes we try to prevent children from crossing busy roads, but unfortunately in some cases it is difficult to avoid. If you are at all uncomfortable with your

child(ren) crossing the road to get on or off their bus we ask that you please assist them. Also, due to the afternoon buses being filled to their maximum capacity, children will not be allowed to use a bus other than their own unless they have permission from a Transportation Committee Member.

Please take a few moments, with your children, to go over the rules for riding the buses (these rules can be found in the Parent Handbook). We have had to deal with some damages done to a school bus this past year so please stress to your children that there will be zero tolerance for vandalism of any kind. Those involved in damaging the bus will be expected to pay for repairs and may also run the risk of losing the privilege of bus service.
